Free Digital Education Resources

MCHA offers curriculum-based digital companions to accompany our award-winning exhibit, Beneath the Floorboards: Whispers of the Enslaved at Marlpit Hall, in Middletown, NJ. Approved by the New Jersey Historical Commission, the New Jersey Council for the Social Studies, and Monmouth University's

School of Education, these resources are grade-banded for Upper Elementary and Middle/High School students, serving as an effective teaching tool for all levels. Students will have an opportunity to "meet" seven of the enslaved individuals who once resided at Marlpit Hall, and learn about what their lives may have been like based on primary source documentation. On-Site Student Tour and Primary Source Experience

Students grades 3-12 are welcomed to this c. 1762 historic house museum, where the program is tailored to their level. After meeting the individuals highlighted during the tour, Upper Elementary students act as young historians to investigate the primary sources used to build the biographies of the enslaved, thereby gaining an understanding of basic historical research. Middle through High School students engage in a **Primary Source Workshop**, where runaway ads, sale ads, and other archival documents are analyzed and discussed.




Hybrid Virtual Program

90-MINUTE TRIP TO MARLPIT HALL

Monmouth County Historical Association

LOCATION:

Marlpit Hall 137 Kings Hwy Middletown, NJ 07748

ITINERARY:

★ Class 1 (9:30am-11:00am)

- Introduction (Foyer): Brief introduction to the home and its construction, the Taylors of Middletown, Edward Taylor's house arrest due to Loyalist spy activities; slavery in New Jersey is introduced and discussed. (15-20 minutes)
- Students are introduced to seven of the at least 12 known enslaved individuals that once resided at Marlpit Hall; students are guided through the house, where each room has a theme and a representation of one of the enslaved in historically accurate clothing. Themes discussed include daily life, abolition, and resistance. (30-35 minutes)
- Grades 3-6 are given a folder with a person to research using the primary source information in the exhibit panels. They will also engage in a spy code-cracking activity. (20-25 minutes)
- Grades 7-12 are guided through the house tour and then brought next door to historic Taylor-Butler House, where they will participate in a Primary Source Workshop. A selection of archival documents used to build the exhibit is analyzed and discussed. An activity using local runaway ads engages the students in breaking down the information in these ads into a graphic organizer to demonstrate the breadth of details included and how they were used. (30 minutes)
- ★ If participating in the combination trip with Murray Farmhouse (see attached itinerary/information), students will board the bus to the farmhouse for lunch
- ★ Class 2 (12pm-1:30pm)
 - Repeat morning itinerary

PROGRAM NOTES:

Program content: The team of historians and educators at Marlpit Hall recognize the delicate subject matter and the importance of imparting the information to students in an age-appropriate way. This program moves beyond the textbook term "slavery" to introduce students to the humanity - and personal stories - of those who lived it. This two-time award-winning exhibit and highly rated education program is supported by the

New Jersey Council for the Social Studies, the School of Education at Monmouth University, and the New Jersey Historical Commission.

Cost:

\$10 per student for a 90-minute program at Marpit Hall only; \$195 per class at Murray Farmhouse. No charge for teachers and chaperones. A single payment for the combination trip can be made to the Murray Farmhouse.

Transportation: When pairing this trip with the Murray Farmhouse, teachers will coordinate with their bus driver to ensure the bus has students where they need to be to maximize programs at both locations.

Weather: Both Marlpit Hall and Taylor Butler House have heat and air conditioning. Grades 7-12 will make a short two-minute walk to Taylor-Butler House next door for the Primary Source Workshop, so please wear appropriate clothing.

Snow Day: A make-up day must be selected in case of snow. If operational constraints prevent both days, a full refund will be given.

Lunch: Marlpit Hall and Taylor-Butler are historic house museums, therefore food is prohibited to minimize damage and/or pests.

90-MINUTE TRIP TO MURRAY FARMHOUSE

MIDDLETOWN RECREATION

LOCATION:

Murray Farmhouse at Poricy Park

TIMING:

• Class 1 (9:45a-11:15a)

- o Introduction (Blue Parlor): Brief history of farmhouse and Joseph Murray (15 minutes).
- Session A (Kitchen): Half class visits the hearth kitchen to see how food was made, hands on activities are churning butter, making sparks with flint and steel, and grinding spices with mortar and pestle (35 minutes)
- Session B (Upstairs Rooms): Half class visits classroom to write with quills, then visit the other rooms of the house to see how children lived (35 minutes)
- o Conclusion (Outdoors): After both halves have done both sessions, rejoin together outside to point out other buildings on property. Sample churned butter on saltines (5 minutes).

• Lunch Break (11:15a-11:45p)

- Class 1 (after finishing at Murray Farmhouse) will walk up hill to Nature Center to use restrooms and have lunch at outdoor picnic tables. At conclusion of lunch, they will board bus to go to Marlpit Hall for their afternoon program.
- o Class 2 (Coming from Marlpit Hall for AM session) will arrive to eat lunch outside at picnic tables. Then will walk down the hill to the Murray Farmhouse for afternoon program.

Class 2 (11:45p-1:15p)

- Introduction (Blue Parlor): Brief history of farmhouse and Joseph Murray (15 minutes).
- Session A (Kitchen): Half class visits the hearth kitchen to see how food was made, hands on activities
 of churning butter, making sparks with flint and steel, and grinding spices with mortar and pestle (35
 minutes)
- Session B (Upstairs Rooms): Half class visits classroom to write with quills, then visit the other rooms of the house to see how children lived (35 minutes)
- Conclusion (Outdoors): After both halves have done both sessions, rejoin together outside to point out other buildings on property. Sample churned butter on saltines (5 minutes).

NOTES:

Program – Introduction will emphasize Joseph's role in Militia and "civil war" of Middletown to contrast with the Taylors of Marlpit Hall. Class will be split to allow for participation in hands-on activities. Upstairs portion will not include using horn books, but these can be substituted for the writing with quills or the tour of the upstairs room, if teacher prefers.

Transportation – With an abbreviated schedule, every minute counts! Teachers will coordinate with their bus driver to ensure the bus has students where they need to be to maximize programs at both locations.

Weather – The farmhouse is heated in upstairs rooms with radiators. The hearth kitchen is only heated with fireplace (which instructors will have burning). There is no air conditioning. Program runs rain or shine. Lunch space inside the Poricy Park Nature Center can be provided if weather requires it. Snow or heavy ice on the ground would require a reschedule – bus and instructors need to be able to drive down a gravel road. If operational constraints prevent the program, a full refund will be given.

Schedule includes no time for Poricy Gift Shop.

1:15p Bus picks up Class 2 from Murray Farmhouse.


1:30p Bus picks up Class 1 from Marlpit Hall.
